#### Poets of Auchtergaven by Thomas Brown

The parish of Auchtergaven is famed for having two poets of note.

Robert Nichol whose monument stands at Tulliebelton and William Robertson whose headstone is in the old part of Auchtergaven Kirkyard.

Robert Nichol is the most well-known son of the parish and recently Mr Michael Lawrence formerly of Bankfoot and son of May, gave a well attended talk at the Church Centre on the short, but productive life of Robert Nichol.

William Robertson was not so well known. He was a clerk at the linen factory which stood at what is now Graham Court. William wrote many poems inspired by his walks across the moor above Cairneyhill and many of these were published in newspapers. He had one book of verse published "Heart Echoes". Sadly he was never to enjoy the fruit of his labours as illness forced him to retire to his bed and the book was presented to him just days before he died.

I also had a volume of poems published by the Porridge Press based in the village. "Summer Paths and Winding Ways" contained poems reflecting on my walks within the parish and contained local themes.
